You said

We listen to the concerns of the community and our priorities are set by local people who sit on a neighbourhood panel. You said the following priorities were important to you:

- Drug dealing in the Somers Town area
- Curnock Estate Street drinking and anti social behaviour (ASB)

We did

We have done the following to tackle these priorities:

Drug dealing in the Somers Town area

Concerns were raised by local community members from Somers Town, regarding drug dealing in the Ossulston Estate and Church Way area. The team have proactively carried out stops, arrests and conducted dispersals on a number of people known to frequent the area affected. Cannabis warnings have also been handed out to individuals. There have been two arrests for possession with intent to supply controlled drugs, one from the Phoenix Road area resulting in a post conviction Anti Social Behaviour Order. The other is still on-going. There has also been a reduction in the number of drug dealers and drug users to the area as a result of the work done by the team.

Curnock Estate - Street drinking and ASB

We attended a resident meeting on the Curnock Estate to listen to the views of the local community. We were informed by



numerous residents that they
were concerned about
individuals, particularly groups
of youths, turning up onto the
estate. The individuals were
causing anti social behaviour
including noise nuisance and
using or dealing drugs. We set
out to combat these



concerns by increasing high visibility patrols and conducting a street briefing. Leaflets were posted to addresses on the Curnock Estate inviting residents to come and meet their local Safer Neighbourhoods team on a Saturday morning in November. The local Estate officer, Councillor's Robinson and Brayshaw attended and refreshments were also provided at the event. Many residents attended, crime prevention advice was given, and individual concerns were addressed.

Since our street briefing was conducted, there has been positive feedback from residents, informing the police that there has been a reduction in the number problems they were experiencing on the estate. There has also been a welcome of the uniformed patrols conducted on the estate. St Pancras & Somers Town Safer Neighbourhoods Team will continue to provide reassurance patrols and listen to the community helping local residents to have a safer.

All of these activities are carried out by your team in an attempt to keep you safer.
